On regular school days, and even our Wednesday early release days, it is impossible to get the whole staff together to have important meetings and trainings to address programs we are implementing and to improve the safety of our school.

This Friday, the staff will be spending time working with school district trainers on social and emotional learning topics, as well as with school district safety officers on first aid and evacuation procedures, in the event of an emergency. These types of training are critical to maintaining the safety of our school, as well as addressing the needs of our students.

We will have four more professional development staff work days. They will happen on November 20th, December 22, February 16th, and May 10th. We understand that closing the school to students can be a bit of a hardship to families, but we feel the value of these training opportunities is priceless.

How do teachers become Montessori trained?



Did you know that it can take 2 years or more for teachers to complete their Montessori training? Teachers who commit to teaching at HDMS already have their Bachelors and or Masters degrees when they start working here. On top of their teaching degrees, teachers who teach at HDMS then agree to attend Montessori training.

The teachers commit to attending training during the summer- often spending the summers away from their home and families. They also work on completing assignments throughout the school year.

In the twenty years HDMS has been a school, we have had a handful of teachers come to us already Montessori trained. The majority of our teachers commit to going to training after their first year of teaching at our school. This is a major commitment! We truly appreciate the commitment our teachers give to the school, the students and our community.


SUPPLY FEES

65% of supply fees have been paid.





NOTES FROM THE GREEN PARENTS GROUP

Now with the new school year rolling, we are yet again asking ourselves and our kids how to fill their tummies in a healthful way. The HDMS handbook has some great suggestions (page 48) that also work at home. Whenever able to, avoid single-serving items, like uncrustables, string cheese, packaged cracker sandwiches, etc. These items are usually more processed -so less healthful- and always create unnecessary waste. Moreover, any plastic packaging may release harmful chemicals into the food it touches (consumer reports). The alternative is to buy food in larger quantities and with as little packaging as possible. Fresh fruit and vegetables are great! Prepare sandwiches and snacks at home, and pack everything in plastic-free reusable containers, such as stainless steel boxes, glass jars, beeswax wraps, etc.

- School-age friendships: how to support them
 - Your child's world gets bigger when they start school. Relationships with other people like the children in your child's class at school become more important.
 - Friendships are good for your school-age child's <u>self-esteem</u>. When your child has close friends, your child feels like they belong. Your child's friends care about your child, and this helps your child feel good about themselves.
 - Friendships also help children develop important life skills like getting along with other people and sorting out conflicts and problems. Children with these skills are less likely to have social and emotional difficulties later in life.

Hello Everyone,

I am so excited to have the opportunity to be in the classroom with the Ruby class for my student teaching internship toward my degree in Early Childhood Education. My name is Elena De La Paz and I use they/them pronouns. I grew up jumping around Central California and moved to Las Vegas at the end of middle school. I decided to move to Reno for school as a first generation student, and the learning curve was a lot but I managed to go this far with the help of friends! Initially, my degree path was in Pre-Veterinary science, but with a lot of thinking time throughout the pandemic I switched over to early education. Before this internship I worked at the Child Family Research Center on campus in the Sarah Fleishman building for almost 2 years with a class starting in the 2s room and was able to work with them until they were 4! It was an awesome experience to bring my knowledge of child development with me into a classroom everyday and bring my own background into my interactions with them. I am proud to be a first generation Chicano student coming from a low income family, and I love sharing my perspective of the world with children and learning more about theirs.

The CFRC allowed me to learn more about different styles of being an educator, specifically the Reggio Emilia philosophy. I enjoy the idea of allowing more autonomy in children's learning, and this brings me to my intentions for this internship. I would love to continue studying other styles of teaching within the Montessori school and continue to imagine ways that we can implement these practices in a district classroom. I hope to broaden the conversations within how we imagine a classroom's day- to-day, and would also like to dismantle many injustices that I have noticed within the education system. I have learned something new every day working with your children even in these 2 weeks, and I hope to continue this and learn more about their interests. So far I have seen their appreciation for nature, their efforts in exploring the idea of leadership, and the emotions that come along with taking that next step in their learning journey. Jamie is such a gem to be with in the classroom, and I appreciate the guidance she is providing me throughout the experience.
